Warrington Local Plan

The Warrington Local Plan has now been formally approved by the Borough Council. At the February Parish Council meeting John Groves of Groves Town Planning gave an update on the Plan and its main implications for Hatton residents.

The group of six South Warrington Parish Councils including Hatton had represented their constituents by being actively involved in the consultation process which began in 2019. Their influence had resulted in substantially less Green Belt land being allocated for development than originally proposed, including land to the south of Appleton and Grappenhall which had been earmarked for housing, and a major employment area close to the M6/M56 junction which was excluded altogether. In part this has been possible by identifying more brownfield land such as the Fiddlers Ferry site. The main impacts of these for Hatton residents would have been increased traffic as well as loss of further Green Belt, and it should be noted that there are many conditions which need to be fulfilled before development takes place, including sufficient infrastructure like new roads for example, the proposed link to Tarporley Road to reduce the traffic impacts on the Cat and Lion junction.

Planning Applications to Warrington Borough Council.

There have been several recent planning applications in Hatton. A single-storey extension at Hatton Hall View, Warrington Rd. was approved in September.

Also approved was an application to end the occupancy restrictions at Hatton Hall Farm Warrington Road, which had previously only permitted those in Agricultural employment.

An application has recently been submitted for a double garage at New House Farm, Hatton Lane. The Parish Council decided not to comment on the proposal.

The Firs, Daresbury

Local residents recently discussed, via the village WhatsApp group, The Firs in Daresbury, which is great for walkers and dog walkers alike.

You can make a nice circular walk from All Saints car park. Turn left along Chester Road, then take a right turn past what was, Duttons Mowers to join a footpath to the A56. Cross the A56 and go straight on into the Firs. Mender downhill onto Delph Lane where you cross the canal and join the towpath. You may see a heron as you walk north past the labs. At the next bridge turn right onto Keckwick Lane and walk uphill past the labs, admiring the various science themed sculptures. Go straight up the hill to cross the A56 again and back into Daresbury village.
